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Using the Question Cube

- Who is the story about and how are you like that person?
- What words, phrases, and statements does the author use that caught your attention? Why? How did they make you feel? What did that make you think?
- When does the story take place? How is it different or the same as the present time?
- Where does the story take place?
- Why do you like or dislike this text?
- How did this new information change your way of thinking about this subject?
